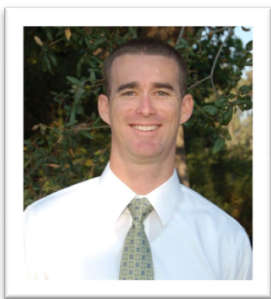

## message from the assistant principal



Hi Oak Crest families!

October was a busy month for promoting good choices and good character with our students. Allow me to share some of what went on...

Bullying is an issue that affects all school campuses, so we take time to talk to our students about it in an open and honest way. The message is simple, everyone is entitled to a good day at Oak Crest and no one has the right to take someone else's good day away. For two days the counselors and I separated the boys from the girls and talked with them about bullying. We talked about the different types and levels of bullying as well as ways to empower students to make a change. Students were encouraged to report bullying to an adult on campus and given techniques on how this can be done without being perceived as a "tattler". We encouraged students to be the voice of Oak Crest and speak out against bullying when they see it happen – the messages peers send to each other are frequently stronger than the ones we, as adults, try to impose.

Seventh graders also attended an "Internet Safety Presentation" put on by Crime Prevention Specialists with the San Diego County Sheriff's Department. Topics included online threats, the dangers associated with initiating online relationships, and the dangers of putting personal information into cyberspace.

Red Ribbon Week included a number of activities that revolved around good decision making and also having some fun at lunch (too bad it was so wet and cold)! The week culminated with our "Welcome Back" dance which was well attended and lots of fun. The library media center has been one very busy place these first few months of school – and that’s the way we like it!

Starting the second week of school, students came to the library for library and computer orientations through their science class . . . Thank you Science Department! All students are now familiar with the library and know how to find books, where to return them, and most importantly, to ask if they need any assistance. They have also set up their own personal account on the computers. Each student has his own password to access their own files here at school and can also access these accounts from home. During orientation, students were also made aware of a very valuable resource available to all students and their families. World Book online is a resource that many students will find very useful. Please feel free to use this site often; it is provided free by the district. All students are also encouraged to obtain a public library card. We are fortunate to have several public libraries located within a few miles of Oak Crest. These libraries offer many services, all provided free. During October, the Islamic Speakers Bureau was visiting Oak Crest and spoke to all 7<sup>th</sup> grade history classes here in the library. The library was also used for a video presentation. The video, “Let’s Get Real,” is a powerful documentary where youths speak up about name-calling and bullying. All Oak Crest girls attended the presentation at the OC Library and the boys viewed the same video at the Boys and Girls Club. Following that, the Sheriff’s Department came to speak to our students regarding computer safety. Again, all seventh graders attended this presentation through their history class . . . Thank you History Department!



We are also starting research projects here in the library. English classes will be visiting to do research on Animal Farm and history classes will be starting their ISearch projects relating to Islam, Africa, China or Japan. In addition, the drama classes will be in looking for monologues!

Book check-out has been busy as well. Several classes have visited and checked out reading materials. In all, over 800 books have been checked through October 15.

We have also been hosting students before school, during lunch and after school. The library hours are 7:15 a.m. until 3:15 p.m. Lots of homework going on in addition to some checker games, chess games and even some lively card games.

## from counseling

Progress reports for the first six weeks were available to review on the Aeries Parent Portal on October 15th. To view the six week progress report, click on the “Grades” tab and then click on grades again. If you have any questions about accessing the Parent Portal, please contact Nadine Coune at extension 3303 in the Attendance Office.

At this point in the year, many students have changed classes. The old classes may still be reflected on the Aeries parent portal and there is no way to take them off. However, the status has changed to “drop”. This is an indication that the student has left the class. Any grade on the portal for a dropped class will NOT show up on any report cards or progress reports, nor is it included on any cumulative record of your student.

On October 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup>, all students attended a presentation about bullying and harassment. Topics included different types of bullying, consequences of bullying and some strategies to help if students are being bullied or harassed while at school. We have a bully box where students can report bullying anonymously. We stressed with students the need for them to be responsible for their own behavior and also how important it is to intervene should they see or hear about someone who is being harassed. Please let us know if your child is being bullied... we are here to help.

Eighth grade parents: The time line for this year’s high school selection has been posted on the Oak Crest website. Please be sure to take note of these dates so that you can make informed decisions about high school and you aren’t missing any important deadlines. You will be receiving more information as it gets closer to high school selection time.

Question of the Month: “It’s been over six weeks now and my child still hasn’t made a smooth transition to middle school. What can I do?”

There are two types of transitions that need to be made when a student arrives at middle school... academic and social. It is not uncommon to see students having difficulty balancing homework, family life and outside activities as the new school year begins. Be sure that your student is organizing themselves for success. Agendas should be written in daily, backpacks should be cleaned out and organized nightly, and homework should be done nightly. Don’t accept the “I don’t have homework” excuse you may hear. Students should have homework nightly. If your child is struggling with the academic transition, you may need to help them set up some type of organization system and monitor their homework closely. Be sure that they are breaking down long term projects into small parts and that they not procrastinating with their assignments. If they are finding the material difficult, encourage them to ask questions in class or during open lunch. Please make sure that you are checking the Parent Portal, checking websites, and continue communication with teachers. The City of Encinitas provides tutoring every Wednesday after school in the Media Center from 3:30 p.m.-5:30 p.m. Be sure to talk with your student’s counselor if your child is experiencing consistent academic difficulty.

## from counseling, cont.

The social transition to middle school can often be overwhelming for students. Not only do they have to adjust to a new school with new rules, they are experiencing new social expectations and pressures that perhaps they've never dealt with before. If your student needs help dealing with this, please encourage them to see their counselor, as we have many ways in which to help. Encourage students to get involved with activities at school, whether it's attending a dance, joining a club or taking some of the after school classes that are available. These are great ways to meet new friends who share similar interests. Encourage self advocacy by role playing conversations that your student might need to have with their teachers. Work with them on graceful ways of getting out of sticky social situations. Just saying no is great, but how to say it can be complicated.

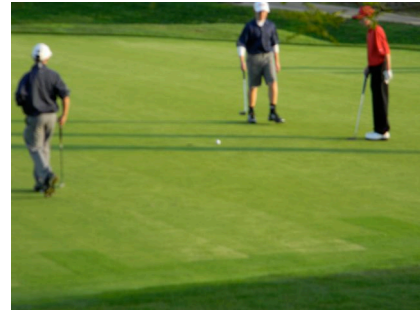
8th grade Physical science class determines the weight of Mr. Williams truck by applying a constant student force and measuring acceleration.
