Positive Capital Facilities Changes at TPHS

Torrey Pines High School has approximately two-hundred fewer students this year, due to a graduating class of 900 (the last class to graduate from an era when we had nearly 3,500 students) and the expansion of Canyon Crest Academy to a four-year high school. We hope that our 2,650 students this year, with no more than 700 per grade level, are experiencing a nice quality of life here on campus with fewer crowds and more parking spaces. Though we have experienced a reduction in students, our facilities within which they learn, play, and practice have been improved, or are in the process of being enhanced. These improvements have been made possible through a district and community partnership.

The Wall

In the past, a wall extended from the administration building diagonally, and it separated the “old” part of the campus from the “new” part of the campus. We wanted the campus to be unified, and we wanted the office to be more accessible to our community. This summer, the wall was removed. Now, it is easy for us to point out the Administration building to parents and visitors, and a secondary pathway makes it easier to access from the quad area. We are in the process of landscaping the area now.

The Book Storage Room

We moved the storage room into the main B building, and it is now just down the hall from the library. This makes it more accessible to our students and staff, and it is centrally located.

The Dance/Music Room

As our music and dance programs have grown, our facilities have not. We did not want our lack of appropriate facilities to hamper the capacity of our students' ability to learn and perform. Working with the foundation and liaisons for music and dance, we were able to pool resources to create a new dance/music room. A space was created by utilizing the former textbook room and knocking down the adjacent wall, behind which used to be the custodial space. Custodial and Maintenance and Operations have been moved to the back of the campus, freeing up the space for learning. The dance and music programs have worked cooperatively to furnish the new room, and it looks beautiful. We're currently working to make the space more “sound proof.”

The Football/Women's Team Space/Trainer Building

The football program raised a significant amount of funds, and the district matched it, to create the Football Team Room. It is



nearing completion and it contains the following spaces: A locker room, a coaching office, a women's athletics room, and a room for the trainer, who helps all student-athletes. This building takes the pressure off of the existing locker room, and replaces some old and worn-out portable buildings, as well as provides for an updated location for rehabilitation needs.

Air Conditioning

The district has been working in phases to provide air conditioning to all of our classrooms. This summer, additional air conditioning units were added to our E and G buildings, and the heating and air conditioning units in the main B building were upgraded.

We always look for ways to create an environment that is conducive to healthy student achievement and provide for access to our community. Should you have questions or comments about any of these changes, please let us know!

Just to clarify some confusion... The start of my third year as an administrator here at Torrey Pines coincided with another exciting event, my marriage to my high school sweetheart. I feel schizophrenic as the name change process concludes itself, but know that I will answer to Ms. Bennett or Mrs. Allen – at least until I get myself trained!

As I mentioned, this is my third year as administrator at TPHS. Before that I taught AP World History, World History and Psychology at TP. I also taught at Coronado High School – where I worked as coordinator of both the AP and International Baccalaureate programs and taught honors, AP and IB level history courses as well as English college prep classes. I also taught grades 7 and 8 at the San Diego Jewish Academy.

I feel a connection with many of our students who are first or second-generation immigrants into the United States since my family immigrated to the US from South Africa when I was a freshman in high school. That experience has made me critically aware of not only the experience of immigrants in our schools, but also the difficulty of English language acquisition. My native language is Afrikaans, but I was lucky that I had some English skills when I arrived here – my younger sister did not. So I clearly remember the struggles she faced as she worked to learn English as well as assimilate into a completely new culture.

My experience in the US has been incredibly positive though overall – I enjoyed American high school and went on to earn a BA in History and Religious Studies and an MA in Education at the University of San Diego. I also had an opportunity to complete another Masters in Early Modern European Material Culture at the University of London, Royal Holloway.

With Mr. Perisic as a new member of our AP team the school year has opened with some new duties, such as working more closely with the Counseling staff and overseeing the Master Schedule. It's been a smooth and exciting start, and hopefully an omen of a fantastic year!

Counseling Corner

Whether this is your first year as a TPHS parent, or it's your 10th year, below you will find some helpful advice for parents of students in each level. Though we encourage our students to become independent self-advocates, we know that as parents, your support and guidance are critical to their success here at Torrey Pines High School, so we trust you will find this information useful.

Freshman parents

We hope your students are settling into classes and adjusting to high school. Our advice to freshmen is to work hard, always complete assignments and get involved with TP activities. Do you know that students must earn C's or better in all semesters of college preparatory classes in order to apply to four-year colleges? Ninth grade *really* counts and we encourage students to get a strong start in order to build a solid foundation for the rest of high school. *Ninth graders will learn about graduation requirements and more in counselor-led information sessions in their physical education classes later in November.*

Sophomore and Junior parents

Please continue to encourage your students to be involved in school and in extracurricular activities that they enjoy. Attendance in class is crucial to academic success. We recommend that all students use the *Choices Explorer* internet program to investigate careers, colleges and options for life after high school. To use the program from home, email Brennan Dean at brennan.dean@sduhsd.net to obtain a password. Please type only the word **password** in the subject line of your email and you will receive an automatic response with the Torrey Pines Site ID and password. Juniors may begin meeting with college admissions representatives who visit TPHS each fall. For information on college representative visits, students must sign up on Naviance. For information on signing up for Naviance, please go to the main Counseling webpage for details. Also, get into the habit of checking our school website weekly for information and updates on what is happening on campus.

Senior parents

Through Senior Audits in September, all seniors should have the information they need to apply to college. The Senior Audit power point can be found on the counseling webpage under "High School." UC and CSU applications **MUST** be submitted online by **November 30th**. To avoid the rush, we strongly recommend submitting them during the middle of November.

Hooray to those seniors who attended "Senior Meetings" on Oct. 17th during the PSAT administration. Students were able to meet with counselors to ask questions and begin their UC/CSU online applications.

Seniors who are planning to apply to colleges that require counselor letters of recommendation need to turn in their recommendation packet by Friday, **November 30th**. Students may download the packet from the counseling website at www.tphs.net under "College."

TPHS Student Directories Available in Student Store

TPHS student directories will be available for a limited time in the Student Store in the Media Center. Priced at \$20, this back-to-school staple is an essential reference source for TPHS students and parents. In addition to the student address and phone listings, the directory also includes the TPHS Calendar for 2007-2008, the bell schedule, TPHS teacher phone extensions and email listings and a map of the campus. Cash or checks are accepted. Checks should be made out to **Dollars for Scholars** or **DFS**.

TPHS Discipline and Attendance Reminders:

Torrey Pines High School Discipline Policy is designed based on Board Policy and State Code of Education to ensure a safe and orderly learning environment. Please take a moment to access the policy online and read it to ensure you and your student know school rules. The entire policy is accessible at <http://sduhsd.k12.ca.us/tp/students/discipline%20policy.html>.

Key items to remember:

- **Torrey Pines High School is a closed campus to all Freshmen AND Sophomores.** This means that Freshmen and Sophomores will **NOT BE ALLOWED** to leave campus at any time during the school day, including the nutrition break and lunch break. Parents who must pick-up their Freshmen and Sophomores during the school day must arrange for an "off-campus pass" with the Attendance Office. Campus is closed to all students during break.
- All students must have an **Off Campus Pass** if leaving campus at any time, which includes not returning to campus after lunch if a student is a Junior or Senior. Off Campus passes must be called into the Attendance Office a minimum of 15 minutes **BEFORE** class begins, preferably 24-hours in advance. Absences will not be excused once class has begun.
- **Cell Phones and iPods are NOT ALLOWED** in classrooms and may be confiscated by the staff members and require a meeting with an Assistant Principal and parents to have the item be returned to the student.
- Students must have a written pass to leave classrooms during class hours.
- Students are eligible for Saturday Schools on their 3rd tardy to class and/or their third unexcused absence from class.
- Academic Honesty is a matter of serious concern. Please read the entire section in the policy for more information. Students can be suspended from school for academic honesty code violation, which would include copying homework or discussion of test questions.

Consequences may include Saturday School, ISAP, Suspension and Expulsion. Suspensions of 2 calendar days or more are accompanied with a 30-day extracurricular activity suspension.

We want to send a **special thank you to our Attendance Staff**, especially **Ms. Liz Barranco**, who have been incredible in not only following up with truancies, but also working with those students to get back on track and be successful! **Great job team!!!!**

School Food Must Make the Grade...

School districts across the country have worked hard to develop wellness policies. When the federal government reauthorized the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) as part of the Child Nutrition Reauthorization Act of 2004, they included a mandate for all school districts receiving federal money for the NSLP to develop and implement a district-wide wellness policy. Rising obesity rates among American children was the impetus for the new requirement.

SDUHSD adopted its policy and implementation is in full force. What does this mean to TPHS? It means all foods sold or served on campus must meet nutrition guidelines as set forth by the state of California Education Code (49430 & 49431.5). Again, what does this mean to TPHS? What it means is that fundraising with food and beverages is much more difficult as many of the items do not meet the requirements for calories, fat and sugar. For example, ice cream sales and gummy worm eating contests are not in-line with the District's commitment to encourage and facilitate programs that enhance student health. An environment pervasive with sweet laden treats and high fat entrees is no longer legal. And so, TPHS along with LCC, SDA, SS, and CCA have to put on their creative thinking caps to brainstorm ways to fundraise and have fun either with compliant foods or without food at all.

Meet Officer Jacobsen



TPHS is fortunate to have **Officer Jane Jacobsen** as our liaison with the San Diego Police Department. This is her second year working with TPHS, and as a Juvenile Services Officer in the new Northwestern Division substation, she is the contact for the 18 elementary, middle, and high schools in Carmel Valley. Officer Jacobsen visits each of the schools regularly, and tries to visit each of the four high schools on a daily basis. She is often consulted about traffic patterns and problems around the schools, serves as a mediator, and acts as a deterrent to thefts. October's Site Council meeting was the first for several newly elected parent representatives. **Corinne Hackbart, Carol Gershenson, Raj Pratha, and Ron Rabens** begin new terms as voting members of the Council. The Council also elected Mr. Rabens as Secretary and Mr. Pratha as Treasurer. We are excited to have these dedicated parents as part of the team.

The Council also welcomed **Katy Goodman** as the new Foundation Liaison and **Dave Hysten** as the Parent Volunteer Association Representative.

The team amended the Site Council bylaws to allow parent representatives to assume their duties at the first Council meeting following the "Back to School Night" elections. The Council reviewed 21 proposals totaling more than \$27,000. Twenty proposals were approved totaling \$24,851. One proposal was tabled to allow time for the gathering of more information. Some of the approved proposals included funding for supplemental books, tutoring, and Math and AP conferences.

Student representatives from each class reported on upcoming events.

Additionally, the Council is in the process of reviewing STAR data. This data will be used to revise the TPHS Single Plan for Student Achievement.
